Grandiloquent	Attempting to impress with big words or grand gestures
Caucus	<b>A meeting of the members of a political party to make decisions</b>
Dromedary	A one-humped domesticated camel
Demonic	<b>One who works devilishly, a persistent person, force or drive; an evil person</b>
Noxious	Physically or mentally destructive, or harmful to human beings
Proficient	<b>Skillful; to be very good at something</b>
