

<b>Denounce</b>	To condemn; to expose critically
<b>Torque</b>	<b>A turning or twisting force</b>
<b>Fathom</b>	To understand fully; to penetrate the meaning of
<b>Docile</b>	<b>Easily taught or controlled; obedient, easy to handle</b>
<b>Hovel</b>	A Small, miserable dwelling; an open, low shed
<b>Balm</b>	<b>Something that soothes, heals or comforts; an oil or ointment</b>
<b>Divine</b>	To foretell a prophecy; to infer, to guess
<b>Alternative</b>	<b>The choice between two mutually exclusive possibilities; a situation with a choice</b>
<b>Countenance</b>	A person's face, especially the expression
<b>Badger</b>	<b>To tease, annoy, harass persistently</b>
<b>Wane</b>	To decrease gradually
<b>Fraught</b>	<b>Teeming with; laden; full; involving; accompanied by</b>
<b>Chasm</b>	A deep opening in the earth's surface; a gorge; differences of opinion, interests, loyalties
<b>Erudite</b>	<b>Deeply learned, scholarly</b>
<b>Also-Ran</b>	One who is defeated in a race, election, or other competition; loser
<b>Elfin</b>	<b>Small and sprightly; mischievous, fairylike</b>
<b>Aggrandize</b>	To exaggerate, to cause to appear greater in power, influence
<b>Ensemble</b>	<b>A coordinated outfit or costume; a musical group</b>
<b>Tether</b>	A rope or chain that allows limited movement; the limit of one's resources or strength
<b>Claimant</b>	<b>A person making a claim</b>
<b>Entice</b>	To lure, to attract, to tempt in a pleasing fashion
<b>Philanthropy</b>	<b>Love of mankind, especially through charitable gifts and deeds</b>
<b>Misanthropy</b>	Someone who hates mankind
<b>Mirage</b>	<b>Unreal reflection; an optical illusion</b>
<b>Noisome</b>	Stinking; offensive; disgusting
<b>Coup</b>	<b>Violent overthrow of a government by a small group; a victorious accomplishment</b>
<b>Hoard</b>	To accumulate for future use; stockpile
<b>Languish</b>	<b>To become weak or feeble; sag with loss of strength</b>
<b>Cloister</b>	A tranquil, secluded place
<b>Oust</b>	<b>To eject; to force out; to banish</b>
<b>Creditor</b>	A person to whom money is owed
<b>Pillage</b>	<b>To rob of goods by violent seizure</b>
<b>Antecedent</b>	Going before; preceding; an occurrence or event preceding another
<b>Embody</b>	<b>To give bodily form to; to personify; to make part of a system</b>
<b>Verbatim</b>	Using exactly the same words, word for word
<b>Truncate</b>	<b>To shorten by cutting off</b>
<b>Remorse</b>	A strong feeling of sadness or guilt for having done something wrong
<b>Forsake</b>	<b>To abandon, to give up, to renounce</b>
<b>Deft</b>	Dexterous, skillful
<b>Ubiquitous</b>	<b>The quality of being everywhere (or seeming to) at the same time</b>
<b>Insouciant</b>	Calm and carefree; lighthearted
<b>Sundry</b>	<b>Various, several, miscellaneous</b>
<b>Callous</b>	Unfeeling, insensitive; having calluses
<b>Dearth</b>	<b>Scarcity; lack</b>
<b>Revere</b>	To regard with great devotion or respect, to honor
<b>Prowess</b>	<b>Exceptional skill and bravery</b>
<b>Generalize</b>	General rather than specific; to form a general conclusion
<b>Legacy</b>	<b>Something handed down from one who has gone before or from the past; a bequest</b>
<b>Phobia</b>	A persistent, illogical fear
<b>Somber</b>	<b>Depressing, gloomy, dark</b>
